MUSIC DIRECTOR STÉPHANE DENÈVE AND THE ST. LOUIS SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA CONTINUE THEIR FRANCO-AMERICAN JOURNEY WITH TWO AMERICAN ELEGIES AND A FRENCH CELEBRATION IN NOVEMBER 2-3 CONCERTS

Violinist James Ehnes performs John Williams' Violin Concerto, Denève leads the SLSO in Barber's iconic Adagio for Strings and Saint-Saëns' Symphony No. 3, "Organ"

(October 22, 2019, St. Louis, MO) – <u>Music Director Stéphane Denève</u>, the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra, and <u>violinist James Ehnes</u> will perform a program of powerful emotional force with a jubilant finish in concerts on November 2-3. Pieces by two American composers—Samuel Barber's *Adagio for Strings* and John Williams' Violin Concerto—and French composer Camille Saint-Saëns' "Organ" Symphony form the Franco-American arch that Denève explores during this program and throughout his first season as Music Director of the SLSO. The concerts are 8:00pm Saturday and 3:00pm Sunday.

The climb up the arch begins with an iconic work from a lesser-known composer and a lesser-known work from an iconic composer. Samuel Barber's masterwork, *Adagio for Strings*, opens the program. *Adagio for Strings* has been played at the announcements of the deaths of Presidents Franklin D. Roosevelt and John F. Kennedy, among others, transforming it into an American cultural touchstone.

Adagio's raw emotional power is followed by another elegy, John Williams' Violin Concerto. Written by Williams after the death of his wife, actress Barbara Ruck, the SLSO gave the world premiere performance in

1981. Ehnes, a frequent collaborator of Denève's and the SLSO, last played at Powell Hall in March 2018, when he showed he had "technique to burn" (*St. Louis Post-Dispatch*). The SLSO will record the performances of Williams' Violin Concerto for future release in the November 2-3 concerts.

Saint-Saëns' "Organ" Symphony closes the program. The composer "gave everything [he] was able to give" to the piece, an accomplishment Saint-Saëns said he would never achieve again. Saint-Saëns' mastery of the organ also precipitated the shimmering prominence of the instrument in the work.
