THE ST. LOUIS SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA AND MUSIC DIRECTOR STÉPHANE DENÈVE WELCOME THE ST. LOUIS COMMUNITY TO FOREST PARK FOR ANNUAL COMMUNITY CONCERT, SEPTEMBER 22

Denève leads the SLSO in a free concert of works by Ludwig van Beethoven, W.C. Handy, Igor Stravinsky, John Williams, plus the first SLSO performances of Florence Price's *Adoration*

Celebratory opening of SLSO's 142nd season concludes with fireworks display over Forest Park's

(August 23, 2021, St. Louis, MO) – Led by Music Director Stéphane Denève, the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra marks the beginning of its 2021/2022 season with the return of its free concert in Forest Park at 7:00pm CDT, Wednesday, September 22, on Art Hill. Since its inaugural Forest Park concert more than 50 years ago, the SLSO performs this annual concert as a community celebration of music and the kick-off of the SLSO's season.

Denève, who recently signed a contract extension to lead the SLSO through the 2025/2026 season, leads this celebratory opening of the 21/22 season, the orchestra's 142nd and his third as Music Director. The concert includes classical favorites like selections from Ludwig van Beethoven's Symphony No. 5 and Igor Stravinsky's *The Firebird*, alongside works by Leonard Bernstein, W.C. Handy, and music from movie scores by celebrated film composer John Williams, including *Harry Potter* and *Raiders of the Lost Ark*. For the first time, the orchestra performs Florence Price's *Adoration*, as arranged by Akiko Hosoi. Price is the first Black women widely recognized as a symphonic composer. The concert includes a performance of "He's Got the Whole World in His Hands," a traditional African American spiritual that features vocalist Nadia Maddex, a St. Louis Symphony IN UNISON Scholar and soprano in the St. Louis Symphony IN UNISON Chorus, the SLSO resident chorus that specializes in the performance and preservation of music from African and African American traditions. The festivities end with a show-stopping fireworks display following John Philip Sousa's patriotic anthem *The Stars and Stripes Forever*.

Performed in memory of longtime SLSO supporter Mary Ann Lee, this concert marks the 52nd anniversary since the first Forest Park concert in 1968. Attendees are encouraged to come early, bring chairs and blankets, and enjoy food trucks on site. The SLSO is following CDC guidelines for COVID safety protocols and is working with St. Louis City and Forest Park to determine what protocols will be necessary. Details will be shared at slso.org/protocols prior to the concert.

Following the concert in Forest Park, Denève leads the orchestra in its first classical concerts of the





season, September 25-26, featuring the first SLSO performances of Jessie Montgomery's *Banner* and Anna Clyne's *DANCE*, performed with cellist Inbal Segev and alongside a cast of dancers from different St. Louis companies, choreographed by Kirven Douthit-Boyd, Co-Artistic Director of Dance at COCA. The opening weekend concerts conclude with Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky's Symphony No. 4. The following weekend, October 1-2, Denève welcomes pianist Yefim Bronfman for performances of Sergei Rachmaninoff's popular Piano Concerto No. 3. Concerts open with Caroline Shaw's *Entr'acte*, Charles Ives' *The Unanswered Question*, and Christopher Rouse's *Rapture*.
