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THE ST. LOUIS SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA GIVES THE U.S. PREMIERE OF ANNA CLYNE'S *PIVOT*, COLLABORATES WITH PIANIST VÍKINGUR ÓLAFSSON, CONDUCTOR DAVID DANZMAYR, AND VIOLINIST SIMONE PORTER FOR THE FIRST TIME IN CONCERTS, NOVEMBER 12-20

On November 12, Music Director Stéphane Denève and the orchestra present a one-hour happy hour Crafted concert at the Blanche M. Touhill Performing Arts Center, featuring a performance of Ludwig van Beethoven's Symphony No. 5

In November 13-14 concerts, Denève collaborates with pianist Víkingur Ólafsson in his SLSO debut on Edvard Grieg's Piano Concerto; concerts also feature Beethoven's Symphony No. 5 and the first SLSO performances of Carlos Simon's *Fate Now Conquers*

On November 19-20, conductor David Danzmayr and violinist Simone Porter make their SLSO debuts in concerts featuring the U.S. premiere of Anna Clyne's *PIVOT*, an SLSO co-commission, as well as Max Bruch's *Scottish Fantasy* and Franz Schubert's Symphony No. 9, "The Great"

(October 19, 2021, St. Louis, MO) – The St. Louis Symphony Orchestra announces details of two weekends of classical concerts, November 12-20, that include the U.S. premiere of Anna Clyne's *PIVOT*, and the first SLSO performances with three guest artists.

Concerts include:

- Friday, November 12, at 6:30pm CT: Music Director Stéphane Denève and the orchestra perform Ludwig van Beethoven's Symphony No. 5 for an SLSO Crafted happy hour concert at the Blance M. Touhill Performing Arts Center at the University of Missouri-St. Louis.
- Saturday, November 13, at 8:00pm CT, and Sunday, November 14, at 3:00pm CT: Pianist Víkingur Ólafsson takes the stage with Music Director Stéphane Denève for Edvard Grieg's Piano Concerto, along with works by Carlos Simon and Ludwig Van Beethoven.
- Friday, November 19, at 10:30am CT, and Saturday, November 20, at 8:00pm CT: Guest conductor David Danzmayr leads the SLSO for the first time in works by Max Bruch, Anna Clyne, and Franz Schubert. Violinist Simone Porter makes her SLSO debut performing Bruch's *Scottish Fantasy.*

The SLSO's hourlong casual concert series, SLSO Crafted, continues on November 12 with a performance of Ludwig van Beethoven's Symphony No. 5 at the Blanche M. Touhill Performing Arts Center at the University of Missouri-St. Louis. Doors open at 5:00pm for this casual concert experience, which includes refreshment specials and an opportunity to mingle with Denève and SLSO musicians prior to the concert.

In concerts November 13-14, Ólafsson collaborates with the SLSO for the first time, performing Edvard Grieg's Piano Concerto under the direction of Denève. One of the most widely performed piano concertos, it appears in films, television shows, and video games alike, including *Red Sparrow* (2018) and *Civilization V*. Ólafsson has built a reputation as a prolific recording artist, whose prior work has earned him the Album of the Year award at the BBC Music Magazine Awards 2019.

To open the concerts, Denève leads the SLSO premiere of Carlos Simon's *Fate Now Conquers*, which draws inspiration from a quote in Beethoven's diary and models the unpredictability and inevitability of one's destiny. A prominent composer of music inspired by jazz, gospel, and neo-romanticism, Simon received the 2021 Sphinx Medal of Excellence, which recognizes the achievements of Black and Latinx musicians. Continuing the fate narrative, the concerts conclude with Ludwig van Beethoven's Symphony No. 5, with its iconic opening statement often called the fate motif.

On November 19-20, David Danzmayr leads the SLSO in a concert with ties to Scottish music and culture. Danzmayr was once assistant to current SLSO Music Director Stéphane Denève at the Royal Scottish National Orchestra. Now, having become a Music Director himself at the Oregon Symphony, he kicks off the concert with the U.S. premiere of a work co-commissioned by the SLSO from composer Anna Clyne entitled *PIVOT*, which draws inspiration from Scotland and quotes fragments of *The Flowers of Edinburgh*, a traditional Scottish fiddle tune. A longtime champion of Clyne's, Denève has conducted more than ten performances of her various works during his time with the SLSO. The SLSO gave its first performance of Clyne's *DANCE* in the opening classical concerts of its 2021/2022 season.

Violinist Simone Porter, who made her international debut with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra in London at age 13, makes her SLSO debut with a performance of Max Bruch's *Scottish Fantasy*, a violin showpiece in four movements, each inspired by Scottish folk songs. The concert closes with Franz Schubert's Symphony No. 9, "The Great," which uses the composer's signature lyricism to push the symphonic genre to new lengths.
